
- Agility



Obedience Report

This term started well with the Puppies Class and Domestic 1 Class having completely full attendance... until Gabrielle came along and changed everything.

Unfortunately, some people had to pull out of classes due to the cyclone and are hoping to return next term once things get back to a little more normal for them. We wish them all the best.

I seem to have a really wide range of breeds to work with this term, which as an instructor, is always something I need to be aware of. What works for one dog or puppy may not necessarily be right for the next. I really enjoy the challenge this gives me and fits right into the saying: *you can't fit a round peg in a square hole.*

Training is about repetition and consistency and rewards. Just a little bit done at home in our everyday life is an easy way to start. You don't need to go out and do formal training. It's better to train every day for a few minutes than with a once-a-week blitz as all this does is reduce your chance of success as they loose interest pretty quickly.

Hallways and lounges are the best place to start off with as they have less distractions than outside.

As trainers, when taking a class, we often notice that many people don't have enough rewards or give enough rewards to their dogs. How can you give them immediate positive reinforcement for all the good work they have just done, if you are fluffing around looking for the treat? The goldmine opportunity just slipped you by.

Remember to be better prepared with lots of treats as you are best to reward with 20 small pieces than 1 large piece. This instantly makes the dog feel the reward has been a great jackpot.

I would like to finish by personally thanking Maria, Heather, Karen and Kay for stepping up again and helping out with our obedience classes.

Have fun with your dogs, they truly are amazing creatures

Vet Report-Nicky Chadwick (Animal Care 2002 Ltd)

Hip dysplasia in the dog

Hip dysplasia is a common inherited problem in dogs that can also occur in other species. It is primarily a disease of large dogs, but it can be seen in any breed. The hip is a type of joint called a ball and socket joint. There is a close relationship of the femoral head (ball), and the acetabulum (socket), which allows transfer of power from the muscles in the leg, to drive the body forward for maximum strength and speed. The ball rotates freely within the socket, and the bones which are covered by a spongy layer of cartilage, are shaped to perfectly match each other. The joint is surrounded by a fibrous joint capsule and contains lubricating oil (joint fluid) allowing for a smooth gliding motion.

Hip dysplasia is an abnormal development of the joint, causing a laxity (or looseness) of the joint. As the joint develops, the two bones lose contact with each other and the socket becomes too shallow so the joint can subluxate, or partially move out of the socket. With time the bones become more deformed, the surrounding tissue becomes stretched, and the joint becomes progressively unstable and inflamed. The lining cartilage and the bone starts to wear down, and bony spurs start to develop. Inflammation leads to fibrous tissue developing around the joint, pain, muscle damage progressive and osteoarthritis.

Cause

The cause of hip dysplasia is multifactorial – caused by several genes and several factors. It is definitely an inherited disease but can also be influenced by external factors after the puppy is born. Excessive nutrition, obesity and an unbalanced diet can contribute to its development. In addition, over exercise in young dogs, can cause increased force on the hip joint and microtrauma e.g. jumping, ball chasing, excessive running and can increase the chance of hip dysplasia developing.

Signs

Not all dogs will show clinical signs at a young age. Some dogs only show signs of pain and discomfort as the joint progressively deteriorates with age, after periods of confinement, or with obesity. Clinical signs range from reluctance to jump, lameness, pain on manual manipulation of the joint, a bunny hopping gait, stiffness when getting up or down, or muscle wastage in the hind quarters.

Diagnosis

Clinical signs may be suggestive of hip dysplasia, but before a diagnosis is made you must consult your veterinary surgeon. Your vet will need to anaesthetise your dog so he/she is relaxed. Palpation may reveal a degree of hip laxity, but X-rays of the hips is the only real method of diagnosis. The x-ray can show the degree of malformation of the joint and will also highlight the degree of secondary arthritis.

Treatment.

Treatment can be divided into nonsurgical and surgical methods.

Non-surgical – the aim is to alleviate signs and progression of the disease, but the deformity and secondary changes will not change significantly.

i) medication to relieve pain and reduce inflammation e.g. nonsteroidal anti-inflammatory drugs, opiates, other analgesic drugs (pain killers).

- ii) **Nutraceuticals** nutritional supplements help repair to cartilage damage and reduce inflammation e.g. glucosamine, chondroitin, omega oils. This can given as an additional be supplement, as a specific diet or an injectable form.
- iii) Weight loss this is probably one of the most important as it decreases weight loading on the joints and helps to decrease inflammation.
- Physiotherapy and hydrotherapy this helps to improve joint motion and to build-up the supportive muscles around the hip joint.
- Warm and soft supportive bedding which support the hip joint whilst resting.
- vi) Low impact regular exercise to build muscle strength but minimise trauma. Minimise jumping and high impact exercise such as frisbee throwing etc. If possible, lift your dog into your car or invest in a ramp if this is not possible.

Surgical – It is beyond the scope of this article to go into detail but some surgical methods available are:

- Triple pelvic osteotomy performed in young dogs prior to 10 months of age. This involves surgically cutting the pelvic bones to realign the joints
- Total hip replacement. Replacing the affected joint with an artificial one by a specialist surgeon.

iii) Femoral head excision arthroplasty. A salvage procedure to surgically remove the affected ball of the joint so the body forms a fibrous replacement joint. This is more effective in smaller breed dogs and rarely performed in large breeds.

Prevention

Prevention of hip dysplasia is extremely important, especially with breeding stock as they have the potential to increase the incidence of the disease. Remember that not all dogs will show clinical signs, so xray screening is the only way to determine if dogs have the disease.

There are 2 schemes available to screen your dog for hip dysplasia prior to breeding:

- PennHIP scheme. The x-ray can only be taken by Penn Hip certified veterinary surgeons and involves taking specialised x-rays that highlight laxity (looseness) of the hip joints. This can be performed in dogs as early as 4 months and is considered to be the most accurate at predicting the onset of Hip dysplasia and osteoarthritis.
- ii. The Willis scheme or CHEDS (canine hip and elbow dysplasia scheme in Australia). Your dog must be x-rayed under general anaesthesia by your veterinary surgeon, in a standard view with the hips extended. One of a panel of veterinary radiologists. then assesses the x-rays and give the hips a score out of 108. This is

divided into signs of hip deformity and changes consistent with secondary arthritis. A score of 0 means the perfect hip – rarely achieved. An average score for each breed is available, and it is important to only breed from animals with a hip score lower than the breed average. Your dog must be at least 12 months of age to participate in the scheme. This scheme is not available in NZ, so xrays need to be sent to Australia (via the internet) for assessment.

As previously mentioned, a good balanced diet, avoiding excessive feeding, plus controlled exercise during the first year of life or longer, are also extremely important to help prevent this debilitating disease.

IMPORTANT HEALTH AND SAFETY NOTICE

So we can keep track of the gear, there is a Gear Book hanging up on the notice board, it must be completed by any **Agility** member who wishes to borrow equipment. **Maximum loan time - two weeks.** It must be dated, have the name of person borrowing the equipment, the equipment borrowed, signed by borrower and **countersigned by a committee member or instructor**. Note on occasion it may not be possible to borrow gear as it may be required by us or another club - please don't be offended if your request is refused.

Agility Link

A reminder to club members that we run agility link each month, normally on the first Tuesday of the month. We run all three classes of agility link – Standard Agility, Games, and Veterans.

The club continues to do well in all three classes, but we would love more people to join us.
