
Agility Report by Dee Ockey

Canine Good Citizen Report by Karen Burnham

Canine Good Citizen (CGC) is about teaching good manners to dogs and responsible ownership to their owners. We have a curriculum from NZ Dogs for each stage which there are four, they are Foundation, Bronze, Silver and Gold.

Each of these stages have assessments that require dog and handler to show competence for a pass.

We meet for training on Wednesday evenings during term time starting at 5.45pm, where we practice exercises from the CGC training manual. Vet Report – Nicky Chadwick (Animal Care 2002 Ltd)

Disk disease in dogs or IVDD (Intervertebral Disk Disease)


Introduction


The back is made up of numerous small bones called vertebrae, starting from the neck to the tip of the tail. These vertebrae are connected together by intervertebral disks. These disks are a pad of fibrous tissue with а central ael substance which acts as a shock absorber, and also allows movement spine. Within the of the vertebrae is a central tunnel, through which the spinal cord runs, to protects from damage. Between it vertebrae the spinal cord runs over the top of the disks. The spinal cord contains lots of bundles of nerves that relay messages back and forward to the rest of the body from the brain.

Causes

With age, and wear and tear, the disks start to degenerate. The outer fibrous portion may start to fray and weaken so that the central gel like part of the disk can protrude upwards

and put pressure on the spinal cord, or nerve roots leaving the spinal cord. This can either happen acutely, where the disk can suddenly rupture and hit the spinal cord with the force of a gunshot, or more slowly, causing small amounts of pressure on the The acute form is seen spinal cord. more commonly in certain breeds of dogs with a genetic weakness to their disks and can happen at a young age. These include Dachshunds, Corgis, Basset Hounds. Shih Tzu's and Beagles. Disk protrusion can happen after an episode of known trauma, such as jumping down, but can also happen spontaneously as the disk is already weakened.





Symptoms

Symptoms depend on the severity of the disk protrusion and the force that it hits the spinal cord. It also depends on the location of the disk injury. Initially it can cause intense pain.

Symptoms include;

- Reluctance to jump, stand up or move.
- Yelping when moving or pain when touched in an affected area.
- Arching their back or tensing their abdomen (with lumbar/lower back injury) or a stiff gait.
- Unwilling to move the neck or holding the neck lower (with neck injury).
- Scuffing toes, dragging the hind limbs or all four limbs, or weakness of the limbs.
- Paralysis unable to stand and support their weight, either just the hind limbs or all four limbs depending on the location of the disk protrusion.
- Organ dysfunction e.g., unable to urinate, defaecate.
- Loss of any pain sensation behind the location of the disk injury

Diagnosis

Your vet may suspect a disk injury based on clinical signs and physical examination of your dog - especially if he/she is one of the predisposed breeds e.g., Dachshund. Your vet will try to determine the location of the pain and also do a full neurological exam to check for signs of spinal cord Further diagnostic testing damage. may then be warranted. Initially your vet may need to take an x-ray of your dog's spine. This may be useful to rule out other causes of back pain or spinal injury, such as a fracture, tumour, or possible infection. Unfortunately, a plain x-ray is often not very helpful to check for a disk protrusion, as the spinal cord and the disk do not show up (only bone can be seen). Sometime though, the disk space may be narrowed as the disk material has moved upwards into the spinal canal, or there may evidence of calcification in a damaged However, if it is important to disk. find out which disk is affected, then more specialised diagnostic techniques are required. These need to be performed at referral centres by veterinary specialists and include a CT scan or an MRI scan. Occasionally Myelography performed where radiographic dye is injected around the spinal cord highlighting the areas of spinal cord compression - but usually CT is the

preferred initial diagnostic technique nowadays.

Treatment

Medical (non-surgical) treatment may be the best option if your dog is only showing mild symptoms. Antiinflammatory drugs are often used to reduce swelling around the spinal cord or nerve roots and they also help to reduce pain. If additional pain relief is needed then opiates drugs, gabapentin for nerve pain, paracetamol or other prescription drugs may be required. It is also really important to rest your dog which helps to decrease inflammation and prevent the disk protruding any further. Your may require strict dog cage confinement for up to 6 weeks.

If your dog has recurrent episodes of back pain, severe pain, or signs of spinal cord compression, then surgery may be the best option. With severe signs your dog will need surgery ASAP to prevent permanent irreversible damage to the spinal cord. This requires referral to a specialist surgeon. After determining the disk involved, the surgeon will either remove the degenerate centre of the (fenestration) disk perform or


decompressive surgery (laminectomy). Laminectomies involve removing a portion of the vertebrae to expose the spinal canal so that the disk material can be removed, and to reduce pressure on the spinal cord. Strict rest with cage confinement is imperative to allow healing to occur.

Prognosis

With mild episodes of disk disease the prognosis for your dog with medication and rest is excellent. However, it is important to realise that the chance of the disease recurring is around 50%, especially if your dog is allowed to jump freely and if he/she is obese.

Dogs that have had surgery also have a good chance of recovery within 1-2 months and with strict rest. Some dogs may be left with some residual limb weakness but can still function well. However, if your dog has had complete paralysis for several days or has no pain sensation in their limbs, then the prognosis for recovery is very poor.


EQUIPMENT AND TRAINING
